John 1:6-8, 19-28

John 1:6-9

6 There was a man sent from God whose name was John. 7 He came as a witness to testify concerning that light, so that through him all might believe. 8 He himself was not the light; he came only as a witness to the light. 9 The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world.

John 1:19-22

19 Now this was John's testimony when the Jewish leaders in Jerusalem sent priests and Levites to ask him who he was. 20 He did not fail to confess, but confessed freely, "I am not the Messiah." 21 They asked him, "Then who are you? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not." "Are you the Prophet?" He answered, "No." 22 Finally they said, "Who are you? Give us an answer to take back to those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?"

John 1:23-24

23 John replied in the words of Isaiah the prophet, "I am the voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way for the Lord.' "

24 Now the Pharisees who had been sent 25 questioned him, "Why then do you baptize if you are not the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the Prophet?"

John 1:26-28

26 "I baptize with water," John replied, "but among you stands one you do not know. 27 He is the one who comes after me, the straps of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie."

28 This all happened at **Bethany** on the other side of the Jordan, where John was baptizing.

- John is described as wearing clothes of camel's hair, living on locusts and wild honey (Matt 3:1-12)
- proclaims baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sin, and says another will come after him who will not baptize with water, but with the Holy Spirit (Matt 3:1-12)

- birth of John was foretold by the angel Gabriel to Zechariah while he was performing his functions as a priest in the temple of Jerusalem (Luke 1: 11-20)
- Zechariah and his wife Elizabeth were old and Elizabeth were barren (Luke 1:7)
- Elizabeth is described as a "relative" of Mary the mother of Jesus (Luke 1:36)


Luke 1:14-17 (NIV)



John 1:31-34 (NIV)


- ³¹ I myself did not know him, but the reason I came baptizing with water was that he might be revealed to Israel."
- ³² Then John gave this testimony: "I saw the Spirit come down from heaven as a dove and remain on him. ³³ And I myself did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptize with water told me, 'The man on whom you see the Spirit come down and remain is the one who will baptize with the Holy Spirit.' ³⁴ I have seen and I testify that this is God's Chosen One."


Jesus is revealed


The Mark of the Lamb (Rev 7: 1-8)




